Speaker Biographies

<u>Plus One</u> - Tom Craig is Community and Learning Producer at Derby Theatre. As part of his role he produces Plus One, a creative partnership project funded by Esmee Fairbairn, and delivered by Derby Theatre with QUAD, Deda and Baby People that provides opportunities for care experienced young people and their families to take part in cultural events and a range of creative workshops and projects. **Lucy James** joined Plus One when she was 16 and has been a both a member and an employee. She is a composer, working recently on Plus One's VR performance 'Odyssey'. She is a huge advocate for creativity in the social care system.

Rosetta Life and Bristol Black Carers - Lucinda Jarrett is a writer, independent dance artist, performance maker and founder and Creative Director of Rosetta Life. Rosetta Life is a group of artists who work with those living with life-limiting illness to shape and share stories that matter through movement, song, image, film and writing. Anndeloris Chacon is CEO of Bristol Black Carers, an award winning charity providing culturally appropriate support and services for young and adult carers from the Caribbean, African and Asian communities and their families across Bristol. In 2021 Rosetta Life worked with Bristol Black Carers to explore healing using the with Carers, using drawing, drama, dance and touch to express what caring role means and for self-care. The HeArt of Care alliance has been awarded ACE funding to deliver an immersive installation challenging representations and perceptions of care.

Live Music Now - Douglas Noble is Strategic Director for Adult Social Care and Heath at Live Music Now where he oversees the organisation's national programme of music and social change in health, social care and community settings. He collaborates with sector partners including care providers, the National Care Forum, Care England and the National Activities Providers Association. He led the Live Music In Care Study team with the University of Winchester, and care providers, which seeded an innovative strand of workforce development in musical care alongside Live Music Now's delivery in care settings. He also works regularly with Drake Music, Hear Me Out and Music for Change, and is a DJ and radio show host. He has worked in the Arts for 17 years after a successful first carer as and Immigration, Asylum and Human Rights Solicitor. Arti Prashar OBE (she/her) Director and consultant. Arti stepped down as Spare Tyre's Artistic Director/CEO in August 2019 after inspirational and acclaimed leadership for 19 years. She is at the forefront of immersive sensory theatre practice for people living with dementia and learning disabled people and has a strong commitment to collaborative arts with values based on human rights. Her research with Elizabeth Lynch MBE includes Visionaries: a South Asian Arts and Ageing Counter Narrative for CADA and Art and Dementia in the UK South Asian Diaspora for Baring Foundation. She was acknowledged in the Queen's New Year list 2022 with an OBE. She received a Tonic Award 2020 (inclusion and diversity) and is a Winston Churchill Fellow 2013 (spirituality, dementia and ageing).
